“ I'm Jim Butch. Virginia's oldest son.

Virginia was a mother of 3 children, me, Bev and Jeff. Originally from Ohio, she was raised in a small town in Pennsylvania called Punxsutawney, which is now famously known for Punxsutawney Phil and Ground Hog Day. When she and Dad were married, they moved to NJ, where most of my Dad's family lived.

I remember in the early 1950's our family would pack into my Father's Hudson Hornet and drive from NJ to Pennsylvania to visit Grandma Strong (her Mother) as well as her brother Paul and his family. We really looked forward to those annual trips. But because we always went in the summertime when school was out, we never did see Punxsutawney Phil.

Mom was a class mother when I was in elementary school. She would periodically come to school to help the teacher with class projects and trips. I remember being so proud when classmates would tell me how nice my Mom was and how pretty she was. She was very attractive.

In 1959 we moved from East Orange to Hazlet, NJ. Mom wasn't a stay at home Mom. She had worked at several different jobs over the years, but the job that she settled on and retired from was right there in Hazlet. She became a window clerk at the Hazlet Post Office, and eventually retired after more than 25 years of service with the US Postal Service.

Mom liked to sew and she was very handy with a sewing machine. She made drapes for the house and did all our clothing alterations. She enjoyed doing needle point and crafts. We have several of her needle point pieces depicting Cape May, NJ historical homes hanging in our home today, and during the Christmas and Easter Holiday seasons we display numerous crafts she handmade of Santa Clauses, reindeer and bunnies.

But by far, Mom's biggest passion in life was decorating. Her idea of a great day out was looking at models of new homes to get decorating ideas. I used to tell her she missed her calling. She could have been an interior decorator. Mom had quite a knack for it. Unfortunately for my Dad, that meant she was always lobbying for a new home.

All of our friends were always welcome in our home. We had a pool and many weekends were spent barbecuing and swimming with family and friends. Mom was a good cook. And when she served food, you[d think she was feeding an army. My personal favorites were her pot roast, as well as her home-made rice pudding and lemon-meringue pie.

My lasting memories of Mom: she was always there for us when we were growing up. She was hard working and would do anything for her family.

I want to express the sadness that all of her children share over her loss. She was a good Mother.

Mom, thank you for everything you've given us and for the time we all shared with you.
