Roanoke, VA--George Dayton Kittredge, age 87, of Persinger Road, formerly of Conway, S.C., died Wednesday, March 31, 2010 at Roanoke Memorial Hospital. Mr. Kittredge was born April 4, 1922 in Springfield, MA to Harry Bradley Kittredge and Hazel May Moore Kittredge. He served as a sergeant in the US Marine Corp during World War II, and saw action at Iwo Jima. After his discharge in 1946, he completed his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Indiana Institute of Technology and a masters degree in industrial engineering from Oklahoma State University. In 1950, he married Mary Charlene Teter, his wife and lifelong partner who passed away in 2007. After working for an oil company and a university he spent the last twenty years of his career with the Environmental Protection Agency, where he worked on regulations to reduce aircraft emissions. Following his retirement in 1988, he spent his time reading the classics, enjoying his family and fishing. Surviving are his son, Ken Kittredge and daughter-in-law, Sheri Kittredge of Huntsville, AL, son Kevin Kittredge of Roanoke, VA, daughter, Katy McGrath Fritch and son-in-law Steve Fritch of Concord, NH; and two grandchildren, Casey McGrath and Krystin Kittredge.
