“ I still have the strands of hair that Paula cut from my son Carlos' first hair cut when he was about 1 1/2 yrs old almost 24 years ago. I say strands, because it was a strip of the few remaining hairs that had never been cut from his baby hair. You know! When the rat tails were popular. We called it his fuzzy. When my mother and I took him for his first big boy hair cut, he was scared and begged her not to cut his fuzzy off. She was very busy, as usual, but acted like he was her only client, trying to calm him because he was so nervous. She talked to him about his cars and showed him some of race cars that friends had given her and about some of his other favorite toys to put him at ease. She also showed him the wall of photos of all the kids that came to her to get their haircut and how we could put his picture up there too. He finally calmed down enough to let her cut his hair, but when she turned on the shaver and accidentally nicked his ear when he quickly turned his head to see where the sound was coming from, then let out a blood curdling scream , we didn't think we would ever get him to come back, but like everyone that had ever met her knew, no one could fix hair like Ms. Paula and he continued the tradition by taking his first son to her for his first haircut, When my sister and her family moved back home from Nevada, she was very concerned that she wouldn't find a stylist that cut her hair the way they did in Las Vegas. After one visit, her husband and both her sons became clients. Therefore, when I was chosen to be the Chair of the Miss Coastal Carolina University Pageant during my junior year at CCU, Paula was the only stylist I wanted backstage for the contestant. Though, most of them had their hair styled prior to the event, she did do some touch-up work. However, she said she couldn't remember when she had so much fun from looking at all the quirky things those girls did, like putting duck tape under their breast for more cleavage or Vasaline on their lips to smile smoothly when their mouth got dry. But, the best part of the evening was when one of the contestants, that was a cheerleader, was doing her routine and after three attempts, threw her pom-poms on the stages, screamed "F" it, in front of all those fine people at Wheelwright Auditorium and stormed off the stage. You could hear a cheer erupt backstage because she had been so

bossy to all the contestants during the practices because she had been in so many pageants and treated them like they were so stupid and didn't know how to do anything. However, I still present Paula a plaque from the Campus Programming Board, as an appreciation, which she proudly displayed in her shop to this day. And every now and then, we would periodically talk about how much fun we had that night and the little bit of justice all the girls felt when that cheerleader messed up, threw a fit and cussed in front all those people. Not only was she one of the best hair dressers that anyone would ever be fortunate to find, but once you met her it was hard not to become close friends because of her warm, funny, and endearing personality. Many a day I would drive over that rutted road to her little backwoods, outhouse-sized beauty shop and could just feel the stress and tension leave my aching, brain dead body, after a week of teaching, then after-school classes, graduate courses, and Carlos' hectic hockey schedule and melt into the chair has she relieved all the stress with her funny stories and the slow, rhythmic message as she worked in the shampoo on my scalp, So most of the time, as anyone can tell you, that 30 minute haircut would slowly slip into an hour or two because it was so hard to leave the comfort of her company and the homey feelings that surrounded you inside that little backwoods beauty shop.
